Interview Time

With: Jose Aldaco, Water School District

What is your job?

I work with students with disabilities ensure that their services needs are being met and that

their IEPs are being followed. I also work to make sure that every person is doing well in our classrooms. I

am also the assistant superintendent of the Waterford School District.

Where did you go to college?

I started at CSU Stanislaus, I got a bachelor's in Liberal Studies and then went back to get my teaching credential. Which lead me to a job as a 5th grade teacher in Waterford. After that I became Vice Principal at the same school, which helped me decide to go back to college and get my administration credential, so I could become the principal. I was Principal for about 3 years, then went back to get my master's degree and became Assistant Superintendent. College has helped me a lot through all of my different jobs. Did you always want to work in education?

No, I wanted to be a veterinarian. I love pets and animals, I like caring for them. However, while I was in school, I had a teacher who inspired me, she helped me get through high school and inspired me to become a teacher. Although Veterinarian was my first choice, I love my job. I like helping people, I like working with kids and teaching them new things, now I work with adults so it's a little bit different but it's all about helping each other.

Where did you grow up?

I came to the United States when I was 14. We came from Mexicali to San Jose to Ceres and I graduated from Ceres High School.

How many years have you been working for Waterford?

I've been working in Waterford for 19 years.

Describe a typical day at the office? I am checking a lot of emails at the office, going through paperwork, making sure student records are accurate. I also have a lot of meetings with parents, students, county social workers, and program providers. What is the best and the hardest part of your job?

The best part of my job is watching people do well, watching them flourish and be successful is what makes me happy. The hardest part is when I have to tell people they are no longer employed, or when students have to be sent to another school because of discipline issues. That is hard. It makes me feel sad, makes me feel like we let them down.

What advice would you give to someone wanting to work in education?

My advice would be to work at a place like here, UCP. I worked at a place similar to this many years ago, I worked in a group home with children from ages to 5-17. Some of them had behavioral issues and had a difficult time controlling themselves and all that experience helped prepare me to become a teacher and work with students in a classroom.

What is your life motto?

I guess my life motto would be to "Ignite people to be successful."

What's one achievement you would like to stand out about Waterford?

The achievement I would like to stand out about Waterford, is that we have a community that understands people with disabilities and that everyone is accepted for who they are and not for what they look like. We work together and provide services for people that need them in our local area.

Do you have a favorite memory from your years in education?

I have lots of them! I was a teacher in the classroom and did NOT like teaching PE. I don't like sweating and I don't like exercising, but I still taught my students to do PE. I love dancing and I found a way to teach my students cultural Mexican dances and for Cinco De Mayo, we did the to do dances on a stage. What do you do in your free time? I have no free time! My favorite thing to do in my free time is to mow the lawn. I like to see the finished product, see the edges are straight, the lawn is short, and all the lines are in a row. But the reason I say I have no free time is because I am on many committees, I help other groups. I am the Vice Mayor of Waterford and I am President of the Waterford Lions club, which all keeps me busy. But on weekends I like to spend time mowing the lawn and walking my dogs.




Andy McGuire
