

With: Matt Harris, Ball Corporation

What is your job?

I am the plant manager, I'm responsible for everything. We have different departments, we make food cans and aerosol cans. We are responsible for making sure everyone is doing what they're supposed to do. Most important is that everyone is being safe.

How did you hear about this job?

I was an engineer manager and I saw an opening for this job and I got promoted. I'm originally from London and I transferred to Atlanta, Georgia first, then here to California. It took many years to get here and a lot of hard work, but I'm glad to be where I'm at.

How long have you been working here?

I've been working in California for 9 years. 4 years in Georgia.

What's your favorite part about your job?

Meeting new people and helping around in the community. We are all looking forward to all the UCP events.

What's the hardest part of your job? Making sure everybody is safe. That they're considerate and doing what they're supposed to be doing from a safety perspective.

Where are you from?

London, England I left London in 2005 and moved to Georgia.

What's your life motto?

Love and respect people and lead with integrity. Always do the right thing for the right reason even if no one is looking.

How did ball get so involved in volunteering?

We have good leadership people that give us time to go and volunteer. Ball Corporation is a family owned business and they have passed along the desire to help in the community. Now we are keeping the tradition going.

What do you expect from people you hire?

Honesty, integrity, and do the best that they can.

Where do you hope to see ball in the future?

We hope to be around many years to come and continue to help in the community.

Fun Facts We Learned About Ball

- Ball is very active in the community through various community service, which is how UCP became connected with them.
- The first Ball can was a wood jacketed tin can.
- Ball doesn't just make food cans, they also make Axe Body Spray cans, WD-40 cans and bug spray aerosol cans.
- Ball no longer makes mason jars.
- Oakdale Ball employs over 120 people.
- Ball has an aerospace division.
- Ball manufactures parts for both the Mars rover and the Hubble telescope.
- Ball was started in Colorado by 5 brothers with a \$200 loan from their uncle in 1880.
- Ball manufactures cans for Pepsi, beer and hard cider.
- Safety is #1 at Ball, they have implemented a "take 5" program, which allows employees to take 5 to make sure they are doing things safely.













Interview Time

With: Rochell Williams, Project Specialist UCP

What is your job?

I'm a Job Developer for United Cerebral Palsy. I create jobs for people with disabilities.

How did you get this job?

I came in through a temp agency and applied as a human resource specialist. But during my second interview I started talking about helping people and getting into the community and they realized I'd be perfect as a job developer

What is the best part of your job?

Being able to help people. I love people, that's just who I am. Being able to make a difference is what I love about my job.

What's the hardest part of your job?

I would say the hardest part of my job is educating people who have often put people with disabilities in a box or stereotyped them and not give them a fair chance. People have a sense of fear, which has become a hurdle to get past that mindset. To convince them that people with a disability deserve an opportunity, that they're just like anybody that doesn't have a disability, they want the same things and with a little extra training that they could be exceptional.

Did you always see yourself doing

I did. I always envisioned starting my own charity, that's always something that I wanted to do. I have always found myself helping people, I have a

lot of people in my family with disabilities, so it was a natural transition. I wanted to be an advocate.

What high school did you attend?

Jordan High school, in Long Beach California, I'm a Los Angeles girl. Graduated with honors and that was the best four years of my life.

What's your life motto?

Take care of others. I believe that God has me on this Earth to take care of others, so I feel if I am helping others then I am fulfilling my purpose.

What's your hiring process?

We do what's called an intake, we find out a candidate's likes, dislikes, their strengths and get more of an idea of where they would fit best in an employment setting. Then I get out there and I create a job for them by meeting owners of different businesses, and from there I'm able to match them up with the best job for them.

Where would you like to see UCP grow from here?

I would love to see UCP have a website that connects the community with the members and parents. A place that would help deal with the different types of struggles within their families. That way we can be able to kind of be the bridge to merge the parents and the people with disabilities with the actual companies. I just want UCP to be able to be an information highway and I want to be able to be connected to every single company and charity that is involved or wants to be involved; let's link together and be a huge community and a huge family in being able to see our members thrive in every single aspect of life. My whole vision is to change the mindset of people regarding people with disabilities and get people to understand that there are rock stars out there and they deserve to shine.
