Hope is also found in the recently approved vaccine usage to combat COVID-19. On a National and State level, UCP has been involved in ongoing advocacy efforts to encourage those that make the decision of who receives the inoculations first prioritize people with intellectual and developmental disabilities given their extremely acute vulnerability.

If you are wondering how to help. Take the time to contact the governor's office and/or your local legislative leaders. Contact County Health officials and ask them to consider those with intellectual and developmental disabilities first for the new vaccine.



While the CDC is expected to release recommendations regarding who will be inoculated first, there is still time to influence the decisions. While the State is expected to follow the CDC guidelines, they will have wide discretion in deciding who to vaccinate next. Some states such as Connecticut and New York have already come out and said people with IDD and their caretakers and DSP's are

in group 1A in the disbursement structures.

Programs Change Lives

A year in the Life of UCP

ost of us welcomed 2020 with open arms and had many plans and goals to accomplish this year. Unfortunately, things did not turn out the way we all planned. Everyday lives were changed dramatically. In early January, we began to hear about a rare virus spreading across China and other parts of the world. COVID-19 "Corona virus" reports warned us of the serious harm. As deaths increased, we realized it was serious. Our government issued a stay-at-home order in early March to slow the spread of CV-19. Social distance, face coverings, disinfect and frequent hand washing were recommended. The stay-at-home order forced many businesses and organizations like UCP to suspend in-person services.

UCP quickly adapted and began to explore different ways we could continue to re-connect with our members and safely provide services. We turned to technology and became familiar with various communication platforms such as Zoom, Facetime, Facebook Video, Google Duo and more. Many UCP members and families hopped on board and connected with us virtually and others decided to continue services via phone. In hopes to challenge our members, we



made worksheets for each member based on their personal goals and delivered them to their homes. Familiarity with the virus nature spiked high demand for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) supplies, sanitizer and disinfectant supplies. Realizing families and care homes rely on PPE supplies to provide care for our members, UCP partnered with Valley Mountain Regional Center and other organizations to gather supplies and distribute to those in need.

In September, Stanislaus county was placed on the CV-19 "red tier" allowing us to provide in-person services in October to those interested. We scheduled for one hour a week and they were modified to comply with the most protective or local CV-19 safety guidelines in effect at the time. Staff implemented enhanced safety precautions such as completing a self-screening before each visit; use of face covering; social distancing; and sanitation before and after each activity. Visits were outdoors on the front porch, driveway, yard or other outdoor structure. Members loved in-person services and we received a lot of great feedback from families. However, our county again returned to the purple tier in November and in-person services were again suspended.

2020 has been a year like no other. We encountered many new challenges, but UCP will continue to provide the best services possible for our members. I thank all of our managers and staff for all the hard work they have done over the year and we look forward to what 2021 has in store for us.

Recycle That Christmas Tree

Looking for a way to use some of your leftover Christmas tree leaves? How about making some simple natural paintbrushes! The **materials** you need to make the brushes are in the photo below – some twigs, twine or string, and some evergreen leaves.

Directions - Lay the string out flat on your surface.



Layer the evergreen leaves around your stick until you have a good-sized brush.

While still holding the twig/leaves, gently lay it down onto the string. Let go slowly – most of the leaves should still stay in place.

Tie the string. Tie twice around each paintbrush so that the leaves would be secure.

Tie as many times as you have to in order for your leaves to stay in place. That's it!! You should have some great looking paintbrushes like these below:

You can use a "slap" technique that, when combined with the evergreen leaves, created a splatter, dotted effect. You can use as little as 3 paint colors to go with the three paintbrushes and go to town with the splattering.
